LETTER FROM THE PRINCIPAL, MRS. LEE



Dear Middle School Families,

Our Middle School Students have much to celebrate at the mid way point of the school year! All students have taken their midyear NWEA MAPS Reading Assessment and have demonstrated tremendous growth. 70% of students in 6th grade and 66% of students in both 7th and 8th grade have maintained or grown their reading level since September! This growth is attributed to the hard work students have been engaging in with their reading. We have developed a culture of literacy within our middle school. Students are engaging with rigorous texts and have common strategies to support their reading development across the content areas. Please connect with your child about how they did. On Friday, February 14th there are *Intervention* Student Led Conferences (SLC), **there is no school on this day.** This conference day has been set aside for students who are struggling to meet grade level standards and expectations and have failed two or more classes for both quarters placing them in jeopardy for attending summer school and possible retention in the grade. The purpose of the conference is to set attainable goals with a support structure in place that will lead to achievement for students. If your child qualifies for this intervention SLC, your child's crew leader will contact you.



The 8th grade students are currently engaging in their expedition, "Finding Home". Students have participated in fieldwork to local cultural locations across Buffalo as well as the West Side Bazaar. There has also been a guest speaker from the Tapestry Community who shared her journey of being a refugee. We have been recognized by and will be partnering with WNED for the important work and topics students are studying. The expedition supports the

Making Buffalo Home Project at WNED. Our students and teachers will be featured with a video piece that will live on the website. This is such a great opportunity to highlight and celebrate the important work we are doing here at Tapestry. Students will be facilitating a Pop Can Drive to raise funds for new American entrepreneurs who hope to start a business at the West Side Bazaar on Grant Street. The goal is to raise \$1,000 by collecting 20,000 bottles/cans. There are bins collecting the donations in the front foyer. Please help us out! Digital character is how you are represented on line and through social media platforms (Instagram, Facebook, TikTok, Snapchat, text messages, FaceTime, Skype, etc.) In December, students engaged in crew lessons around building a positive digital character. We have found that students often engage in more digital dilemmas over extended school breaks. The longer it takes for a student to get help, the more lost they become since the learning continues forward.

Your child suddenly refuses to discuss school: This could be a signal that something is not right at school which can be limited to subjects they are struggling with.

Your child has a sudden major attitude about school: If your child suddenly becomes distant or angry towards school, you can bet they do not like how things are going at school. Another big attitude shift to watch for is boredom. Often kids will complain they are bored when they don't understand what is going on at school.

Your child begins having trouble sleeping or eating: Problems eating or sleeping often result from worry. Older children and teens may be aware of the overall importance of school to their future and are concerned about their future success if they fall behind.

Your child spends an excessive amount of time on homework: It is a big warning sign if your child is falling into a pattern of having no free time outside of school because they are spending all of their time on homework.



Your child's teacher expresses concern: If your child's teacher believes that your child is struggling more than other students, pay attention to what the teacher is saying. Your child's teacher letting you know about a change in their academic progress is the teacher's way of giving you a chance to address any issues they may see beginning to develop.

They begin misbehaving at school: Sometimes misbehavior at school is really your child's way of trying to take attention off the fact they are struggling in school.

Your child receives low grades: The sign is an obvious one, yet sometimes children and school parents do not want to believe the child is struggling. An occasional poor grade on one assignment may not be cause for serious concern, but a pattern of low grades - or worse - a report card full of poor grades is a concern

EXPEDITIONARY LEARNING (EL), MRS. KAUFFMAN



Tapestry prides itself as being an El Education School. Being a part of EL Education inspires a unique approach to teaching and learning. As an EL Education school, we don't just value academics. We value character development and community.

We have multiple traditions at Tapestry Middle School to inspire a sense of belonging and a sense of purpose. We have school-wide and grade level community meetings that celebrate student success and bring the students together. We celebrate academic success through a quarterly celebration

called the Breakfast of Champions. We engage in team building, both as day long outings and in crew on a weekly basis. We promote a sense of community by giving opportunities for our students to give back to the community throughout the year. We have PIRR days. PIRR days are quarterly events where students spend the day, mostly in crews building relationships with their classmates by engaging in a tailored activity. During the PIRR day, we give space and time to pause and ask the students to think about their academic and social and emotional well-being. Finally, we end PIRR days with a school-wide celebration or community meeting.

The effort and intentionality it takes to make this kind of culture a reality is often intense, but it is well worth it.

VISUAL ARTS

Grade 6

Students in grade 6 have been constructing collages inspired by Romare Bearden.

Romare Bearden was an African-American artist and author. He was very well known for his oil paintings and collages.

Students in grade 6 also went on a fieldwork adventure to the Burchfield Art Gallery. There they explored Op art from artists of Contemporary times, the Rumsey Collection, and some of the Charles Burchfield's collection. They even participated in a watercolor exercise in the galleries art studio.



Grade 7

Students in grade 7 are continuing to explore wiring techniques in jewelry making. Each student is learning to apply wire of various gauges and hardness. Some of these wires have been applied to pendants with stones, and hand crafted rings.

Grade 8

Students in grade 8 are sketching iconic characters (original

characters or text) that exemplifies the comic style of the Pop Art Movement from 1960's to Contemporary times. These large renderings are being transferred onto hand stretched canvas.





Band

Exciting things are happening in the Tapestry Band program. In January we had Grammy nominated music educator and proprietor of Pagu Batons Phil Aguglia in as a guest expert. The Tapestry Jazz Ensemble performed at Babeville's Asbury Hall as part of the Music is Art Winter Jam Jazz Festival.

This month the Tapestry band program is busy getting ready for our next performance February 13th as part of the Black History Month Program. We will be bringing in guest musicians Greg Millar and Dalton Sharp to give masterclass and perform with the students.

Guitar

Grade 6: The sixth grade guitar students are working on "Don't Worry Be Happy" by Bobby McFerrin. The song allows us to develop techniques such as strumming and chord changes. They continue to improve their skills in technique, posture, reading, and musicianship.

Grade 7: The seventh grade guitar students have begun working on "Ransom" by Lil' Tecca. This song features four chords, a tricky

strum pattern, and the use of a capo. We are also starting to polish "Don't Worry be Happy" by adding a bass line.

Grade 8:The eighth grade students are preparing for the Black History Month concert, where they will be performing "All Falls Down" by Kanye West. In addition, we continue to review our pentatonic scale, "Key to the Highway," "Allstar," and "Blackbird."
